2. Characters



You can also discuss a character's strengths and weaknesses using the SADDR structure. You could do a SADDR character analysis that looks at just the negatives about a character, or just the positives. You could do one for each and then you would have enough information for several paragraphs about that character.

Here is an example, about Hermione. In this example, the different parts are taken from different places in the book. More of the good parts come later on in the book though, because it took some time for her good qualities to show themselves and for her to become friends with Ron and Harry and Neville.

Answer these questions about the examples on the next pages, or (if students have achieved a level of independence in learning to do this) just use the examples as a model for the next exercise.

1. What is at least one way that the idea that Hermione is a conceited snob supported? (quote, action, speech, drawing or reaction of others?)
2. What is at least one way that supports the idea that Hermione is bossy?
3. Look at the second SADDR example. What is at least one way that supports the idea that Hermione really wants to help people?

Example 1

Speech: Chapter 9, p. 155: "I almost told your brother," Hermione snapped, "Percy — he's a prefect, he'd put a stop to this."

Hermione is trying to boss Harry and Ron around, and keep them from going to the Wizard's duel that Draco Malfoy set up with Harry. Or on p. 160: "Oh, move over," Hermione snarled. Even when she is helping them get away from

Know your characters with

Action (something the character does):
Chapter 8, p. 137: Hermione stretched her hand as high into the air as it would do without leaving her seat, but Harry didn't have the faintest idea what a bezoar was.

Hermione wants everybody to know she knows the answer because she is a snob.

Description: Chapter 5, p. 105: She had a bossy sort of voice, lots of bushy brown hair, and rather large front teeth.

Her bossy voice tells you she wants to take over and probably likes to see other people get into trouble. Character's name \ and characteristics:

Hermione Granger is an unfriendly snob who likes to get people into trouble.

Reaction of others: On p. 106
Ron says he hopes that whatever
house he is in, she won't be in it.
He is reacting to her being so bossy
about the toad, and showing off
how much she knows.

Example 2

Speech: Chapter 10, p. 177: "I went looking for the troll because I - I thought I could deal with it on my own — you know, because I've read all about them."

Hermione is helping Ron and Harry get out of trouble, even though it gets her into trouble and makes her look like she is conceited.

Know your characters with

Action (something the character does):
Chapter 11, p. 191: Hermione ran to Professor
Snape and was smart enough to know the
spell to set his robe on fire and keep hime
from casting a spell on Harry, who she was
trying to help.

Description: Chapter 6, p. 106: Hermione said everything about herself fast — because she was so nervous at meeting everybody and at not coming from a wizard family. She was trying to show that even though he wasn't from a wizard family, she was going to work hard and be a good wizard, not show she was better than the others.

Character's name and characteristics:

Hermione Granger is very smart but nervous girl who wants to help people.

Reaction of others: In Chapter 11, p. 181, Harry relies on Hermione to help him with his homework. He reads the book she lent him, and they tell her everything that is going on because they know they can trust her.
